



A labyrinth is a pathway that turns back on itself (changes direction) before reaching a center.

Why is labyrinth prayer becoming so popular world-wide? It provides a "new" way to pray.







The oldest Christian labyrinth still in existence can be found in Algiers, Africa is dated from 324 C.E.




"Thus says God: Stand at the crossroads and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls."

There is a cross in the center of most labyrinths.

"Jesus himself came near and went with them..." Luke 24:15 Church Garden Labyrinth, 7 circuit "heart of Chartres", Baltimore, Maryland, USA What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 1. People to encounter God in an intentional and extended way. Example: "As I was moving I began praising God..."



What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 2. People report a transformation in their thinking and feeling. Example: "When I started I was sad. While I was walking I began to feel joy."



San Francisco Theological Seminary, San Anselmo, California (USA)

What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 3. Unarticulated hopes, dreams, values, concerns, priorities, memories, perspectives, and insights surface. Example: "For the first time I felt that things could change..."



Franciscan Retreat Center, Pheonix, Arizona (USA)

What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 4. It allows people to realize scriptural truth at a deeper level. Example: "As I went around and around I came to understand that God really is the light of the whole world."

What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 5. It is a special place where one can go to be with God. Example: "I need a quiet place to pray. The labyrinth is my prayer village..."

What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 6. It is a spiritual practice ground. Example: "As I prayed, I realized that many of my prayers are very short. I want to find a way to pray for longer, the way I did on the labyrinth."



What are the benefits of labyrinth prayer? 7.It allows people to understand more about their lives and faith. Example: "As I walked, God showed how He has been working in my life."



People enjoy praying with their whole bodies, not just their minds.

Most people report feeling calm and peaceful during and after praying a labyrinth.

People pray the labyrinth in the many ways that they usually enjoy praying. There is no one "right way" to pray the labyrinth.

There is always just one path that always leads to the center. You can not "get lost" when praying on a labyrinth, but you can get turned around.

If you get "turned around" on the path, you will either end up at the threshold or the center. If that happens, decide where your prayer is inviting you to go.

The pace with which you pray the labyrinth will vary. This is okay.



When starting to walk after another person, give him/her a little space to find his/her own pace.

If you meet someone going the opposite direction, do whatever you would usually do if you met someone on a narrow path.

God can use everything that happens during your labyrinth prayer to teach, encourage, and guide you. Pray the labyrinth as if you were looking into a mirror to understand more of what God wants you to see.

Approach your labyrinth prayer with curiosity. Be open to discovering what God may communicate in this safe environment.

Sometimes people pray the labyrinth by themselves.

Today we will be walking the labyrinth contemplatively while asking God for wisdom for our ministries.





Preparing: decide what you would like to pray about before you begin



Chartres-style grass and brick labyrinth, DeepHaven Retreats, Minnesota (USA)

Threshold: pause to honor the beginning your labyrinth prayer and ask God to walk with you




Threshold Stone, Chartres Cathedral Labyrinth, Limestone and marble stones, Chartres, France

Pathway: moving towards the center (follow where you are led)



Turns: changing direction while still on the way to the center (seeing something from a different vantage point)

Center: resting in God's love (stay as long as you like)



Returning: Taking the "same path" back out to the threshold.

As you come to the "end", give thanks for how God has been with you and what God has shown you.

What is the Holy Spirit saying to me RIGHT NOW?

What needs to change in the way I live my life?

What needs to change for my leadership to be more fully aligned with God's will?

If my leadership was more fully aligned with God's will, how would I pastor differently?

Or, pray about something else that God is leading you to pray about.

Use this time to reflect on your labyrinth prayer. Write or draw your responses to any of the following questions.

What is the Holy Spirit saying to me RIGHT NOW?

What new insights or convictions did I receive?

How might I need to align my will to God's will for my life and leadership?

What physical messages did I receive while moving my body in prayer? What else do I want to reflect on from my labyrinth walk?



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
