Time of Personal Prayer and Reflection during a Funeral

Sample Introduction:

Questions have the ability to bring what is important into focus. They can point us in the right direction. They can offer unlimited possibilities. As I walked alongside my friend through the varying stages of his illness, there were some questions that his life asked me. I began asking these questions as I sat quietly with God.

I am going to share four of these questions. Once I have spoken one, I will pause for about half a minute. I invite you to enter an attitude of prayer. In God's presence, allow each question to take you where it may.

(Note: The word "cancer" may be replaced by a word that more closely describes the reality of the situation.)

Guided Prayer:

From the *earliest* stages of my friend's journey with cancer came this question. In the silence, prayerfully consider: *What changes do I need to make in my life so that I can live more fully?*

(Wait half a minute.)

From the *first half* of my friend's journey with cancer came this question. In the silence, prayerfully consider: What can I do to make my community a better place, even if I can't do everything that I want to?

(Wait half a minute.)

From the *second half* of my friend's journey with cancer came this question. In the silence, prayerfully consider: *What do I believe will happen to me after I die?*

(Wait half a minute.)

From the *end* of my friend's journey with cancer came this question. In the silence, prayerfully consider: *In what ways is it time for me to let go and let God?*

(Wait half a minute.)

May these questions, as well as the many other questions that those who have died asked and lived, inspire and nourish us.
